## Focusing on What Unites Us

You may have noticed recently the message on our sign: “We need not think alike to love alike.” You may also have seen that quote in various other places, such as Congregation Shir Shalom, Calvary Episcopal, or Christ United Methodist. The reason for this sudden unity is this: Two years ago the congregation of the Unitarian Universalist Church in Williamsville, after much discussion among themselves, took the step of adding the banner “Black Lives Matter” to their outdoor sign. It is an expression of their core belief that all people regardless of skin color should be valued and treated with fairness in our society. They are standing with many people of color in the U.S. who have experienced brutality in our criminal justice system.


This past November the sign at the Unitarian Church was defaced. At the time the vandalism received a modest amount of media coverage, but the Williamsville Interfaith Clergy Association did nothing in response collectively. November and December is a time of year when many of our

congregations are preoccupied with holiday celebrations, annual meetings, and various other concerns, so nothing was organized. In January, however, we did hold a special meeting to speak with the pastor,



Michelle Buhite, at the Unitarian Church to learn what we could do in response.

After hearing their story and sharing a bit about other concerns we have in common, Rev. Buhite suggested the phrase “we need not think alike to love alike” as a shared motto to which we could all agree. The quote comes from Unitarian history of uncertain attribution but

has been claimed as a motto expressing their commitment to inclusiveness for many decades.

We at North are happy to adopt that motto as our own. We have a commitment to inclusiveness and acceptance that we want to

share with the community. Several folks have commented how nice it is to see such agreement among our various congregations. We so often focus on our differences; it’s good to stand together and affirm what we hold in common.

Of course, we only have the one sign and from time to time will need to change the message on it. After Easter there will likely be some other message we’ll want to share. But we don’t want to lose the quote entirely. So there will be an opportunity for us to spread the message of mutual love into our neighborhoods through yard signs that are being printed for distribution in our congregations. Those will be available soon, so stay tuned.

North has a long history of working with other worshiping communities for the common good. This is one more expression of that cooperation and devotion. At a time when

politics and social issues have become so divisive and hostile in our society, it’s important our worshiping communities are able to find meaningful areas of agreement to help realize the possibility of a society committed to justice and peace.

The results have been tallied, and the worship times that you indicated you want are **8:00 and 10:15 a.m.** Session has voted to begin these new times on **Sunday, March 4.**

## **Change to Sunday School Program**

As part of the called Session meeting on Monday, January 22, Session voted to eliminate the position of Sunday School Administrator from the 2018 budget. North Church wants to thank Kim Will for her service to our Christian Education program. At this time, Session members Marsha Villano and Rob Powell, and Session member-elect Debbie Hutton will serve as liaisons to the program. ## **Summary of Annual Meeting**

On Sunday, January 28, 2018, North held its annual congregational meeting at 8:15 a.m. in Westminster Hall. Treasurer Mary Beth Karr gave an overview of the budget, noting that 2017 was the first time in this decade that we have ended the year operating in the black. She

also noted that Session was still finalizing the 2018 budget so was unable to present one at this time. (If you were not able to attend the meeting and you wish to have copies of the documents that were circulated, please contact the church office at 716.632.1330.)

In other matters, the congregation approved the pastor's Terms of Call. Congratulations to the Rev. William Hennessy, who has begun his 10<sup>th</sup> year at North.

Mary Soom, a member of the Mission Committee, gave a brief report of their work. She noted that the congregation has been generous in giving above and beyond the budgeted nearly \$8,000 by almost \$44,000 to help in such areas as refugee services, feeding the hungry, and peacemaking.

Elder Joe Alber thanked Elders (Session) and Deacons who will be completing terms of service this spring. Elders in the Class of 2018 include Joe Alber, Ralph Doerzbacher, and Bill Ervin. Deacons in the Class of 2018 include Glenn Hopkins, Shirley Mazourek, Garry Ostermeier, and Pam Ostermeier. Alber, Doerzbacher, Hopkins, and the Ostermeiers have agreed to serve in their respective roles in the Class of 2021.

Elected as Elders in the Class of 2021 were Mary Atwood, Debbie Hutton, and Marty Shafer. Elected for Deacons in the Class of 2021 were Chris Gunther and Karen Roesser. Thank you to everyone who agreed to fill a role.

## **Adult Bible Study**

The Adult Bible Study meets most every Sunday, except during the summer, at 9:15 a.m. in the Resource Center for one hour. Attendance runs from five to 10 people, and there is room for more.

Over the past few years our studies have included Luke’s and John’s gospels, the book of Acts, and the life of Joseph and his family. Currently we are studying the scriptures in the

lectionary for the Sunday on which we meet. We open and close each session with prayer.

The leader of each session is a volunteer from among those who attend. However, there is absolutely no requirement that attendees must lead a session. It is just fine to attend and listen. Our objective is spiritual growth, by learning more about God’s plan for us and about life as a Christian from the Bible, Old and New Testaments, and from the questions we raised and the comments presented.

Leaders have resources from the Resource Center and North Church library to help them prepare, including Bible commentaries. Some attendees use their personal Bibles, including study Bibles, and for others, there are always church pew Bibles available. We welcome any translation or version of the Bible. We have found that this variety often enhances our understanding.

We do not use resources that require prior purchase by attendees. Also, each session is independent from previous sessions so steady attendance is not necessary. We welcome any church member or visitor to attend. Ages of attendees have ranged from early twenties to persons in their eighties.—submitted by Elder Bill Clark


We serve a meal at Friends of Night People at 394 Hudson St., Buffalo, the fourth Tuesday of every month.

## Special Offering: Care Cases of WNY

*Whoever welcomes a child in my name,  
welcomes me—Mark 9:37*

The mission of Care Cases of WNY is to provide comfort, hope, and dignity to local children placed into foster homes by providing each child with a “Care Case.” These duffel bags and small suitcases are filled with new/unused comfort and care items that are customized for boys and girls in varying age groups. Cases are filled with personal care items, books, a comfy blanket, and other articles. Each case includes a tag that states, “You matter.” Social workers distribute the cases through local foster care agencies.

During the season of Lent, our congregation will be collecting items to complete Care Cases for local children. There are several ways that you can help. You may wish to donate a duffel bag or perhaps some items needed to stock a Care Case. Or, if you are able, you and your family may wish to complete an entire Care Case (it is estimated that it costs approximately \$50 to assemble each Care Case). Monetary contributions are also greatly appreciated. The items needed to complete a care case are:

- A duffel bag or small suitcase
- Fleece blanket (60” x 80”)
- Stuffed animal (approximately 14”-16” tall)
- Toothbrush and toothpaste
- Shampoo and conditioner

- Body wash or soap
- Body lotion
- Deodorant
- Coloring book and crayons
- Books (toddler through teens)
- Journals, pens, pencils

There will be a table in the narthex each Sunday during Lent where you can donate items or make a monetary contribution to this project. Checks may be made out to NPC with Care Cases of WNY on the memo line. Thank you in advance for your generosity in helping these children who live in our community.

## Thank You: Update on Pledges

As of February 23, seventy-nine individuals and couples have pledged \$196,508 to North for its 2018 budget. Thank you! Your gifts help the Session greatly as they develop the church’s annual operating budget. It is not too late to make your pledge; Session continues to evaluate North’s projected income and expenses. North is fortunate to have many donors who give regularly to the church. Indicating what you intend to give during the year by completing a pledge card helps the Session



project the church's donations income. Pledges and gifts are kept confidential.

For 2017, eighty-four couples and individuals pledged \$208,872 to North. Their pledge payments totaled \$218,364, thanks to several payments above the original pledge amounts.

## Repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery

The 222nd General Assembly (2016) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) called the church to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery, as have several other religious denominations. We were also asked to review and study the issue, so a group of us did so one Sunday evening last fall at North. The next GA, meeting next summer, will take up a report on the issue.

The Doctrine of Discovery was first articulated in 1452 by Pope Nicholas V as the Papal Bull “Dum Diversas” and in 1496 by King Henry VII of England as a patent granted to John Cabot, which authorized and justified the destruction, killing, and appropriating of the lands of indigenous peoples and nations. The Doctrine of Discovery was incorporated into U.S. law by the Supreme Court in 1823 when it stated that Native Americans had lost their rights to complete sovereignty as independent nations and retained a mere right of occupancy in their lands.

It can be disturbing to realize that the taking of Indian land was justified by an appeal to the Christian religion. Is there anything we can do?--beyond repudiating a legal precedent that has been used in the courts as recently as 2005, in a case involving the Oneida and some land in upstate New York.

In a recent letter to the *Buffalo News*, I protested the President’s decision to drastically reduce the size of the Bears Ears National Monument. This decision was apparently designed to open up the land in Utah to uranium mining. In doing so, severe cuts were made in the only National Monument with a unique arrangement for sharing administration between the U.S. Government and the five tribes in the area. Native Americans have already disproportionately carried a load of radioactive contamination from uranium mining and nuclear testing.

Right here in Western New York, the Cattaraugus Seneca Reservation is immediately downstream from the West Valley Nuclear Demonstration Project, a dangerously eroding deposit of nuclear waste. We can also be activists for a proper cleanup there. Many North Church folks signed letters and petitions in support of full cleanup at West Valley in 2009. Another round of decisions will be made this year about West Valley and will also invite our response.

We can prepare by learning more about the potential health impacts of West Valley nuclear waste on the Seneca but also on our own Erie County drinking water at a presentation on Thursday, March 1, at the Burchfield Penney Art Center at 7 PM. The keynote speaker will be Alan Lockwood, MD, of the Physicians for Social Responsibility.

What else can we do? Recently I’ve been receiving letters and e-mails bearing this

acknowledgement, perhaps we can occasionally put it out there on a personal or church communication:

We acknowledge that the place in which we gather is part of the land of the Seneca Nation, a member of the Haudenosaunee/Six Nations Confederacy. Today, this region is still home to the Haudenosaunee people, and we are grateful for the opportunity to live, work, and worship in this territory.
